Background

In 2004 the Home Office set out a vision for policing which is accessible and responsive to citizens needs. This was evident in a number of documents including 2004 - 2008 Home Office Strategic Plans and the white paper Building Communities, Beating Crime. These documents present Neighbourhood Policing as a key component of the Police Reform Programme.

Neighbourhood Policing should bring together the Police, Local Service Providers and the Public to provide an effective problem solving approach in response to neighbourhood concerns. Neighbourhood Policing will look at the type of issues that the public want the police to deal with, work with partners and the community to reduce the growing fear of crime.

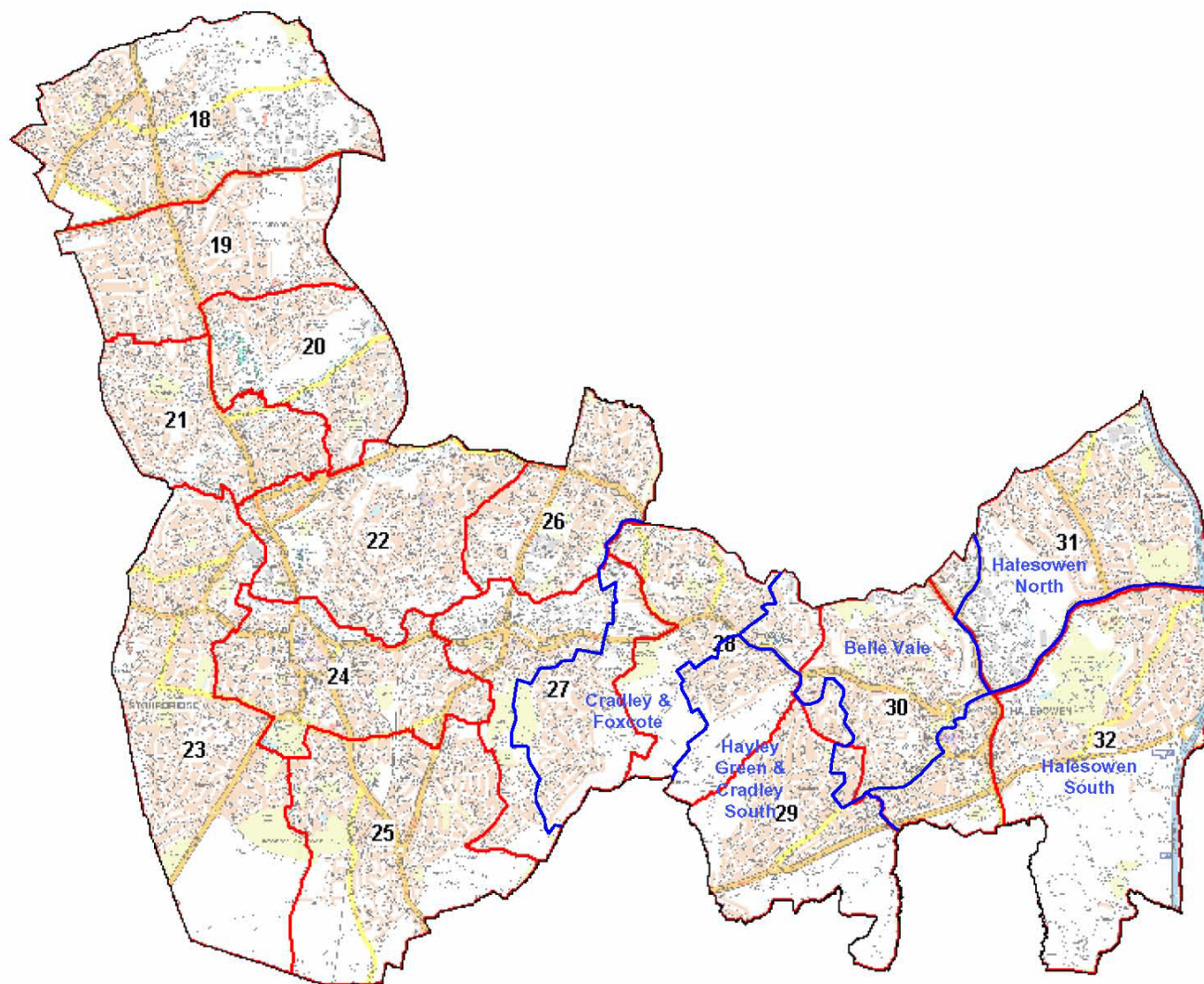
The government timetable for Neighbourhood Policing requires that all forces have dedicated resources in place in every community by March 2008. ACPO and Chief Constable Matt Baggott, who is the lead on Neighbourhood Policing, are overseeing its implementation. Chief Constable Paul Scott-Lee has directed that the West Midlands Police will move to Neighbourhood Policing during the summer of 2006.

The J2 Neighbourhood Policing Project Team has overseen the public consultation of over 4,000 Dudley South residents. They were asked to define their communities and list their concerns. The communities were then mapped and clustered into 15 Neighbourhoods.

The project team recognised the excellent results that had been seen by the teams who were already working in areas such as Highfields, Claycroft and Enville. Therefore each Neighbourhood will have dedicated officers and PCSO's who will provide visible reassurance, and be identifiable and known to the residents of that community.

The project has now reached the implementation stages, and Neighbourhood Policing Teams will be live across the OCU on 4th September 2006.

PACT

Partners and Communities Together

The Dudley South OCU have adopted the PACT meeting as a way of regularly gaining community views and using those views to influence the Policing priorities.

The meetings will be held at local venues, which the community can access with ease. The meetings will be held approximately every 8 weeks. At the meeting the community will have the opportunity to voice their issues and concerns from their community, and at the end vote on the top 3 priorities.

Following this meeting the Partners at the meeting will discuss the top 3 priorities, ownership of each priority will be agreed and actions by each partner in relationship to that priority also agreed.

Therefore 3 issues that affect the community will be addressed over the next 8 weeks. The actions decided on will be achievable and following the implementation of the agreed action plan, the issues will be addressed.

At the next PACT meeting the Partners will explain to the community what actions/results have been achieved and will also give the community chance to feedback their views on how those issues have been addressed.

The vision is that by addressing issues that affect the communities' quality of life, not only will that improve, but also the communities trust towards the Police and Partners will improve and result in more confidence in Neighbourhood Policing.
