London 2012 – Projects and Activities in Dudley

Purpose of Report

 To provide the Regeneration, Culture and Adult Education Scrutiny Committee with an update on Cultural Olympiad and London 2012 related matters.

Background

2. The Olympic and Paralympic Games in London 2012 provide a wide range of opportunities for people from across the United Kingdom to become involved. Participation is not restricted to the sporting events but involves a wider offer of cultural activities. In Dudley there is wide ranging engagement with London 2012 and this report endeavours to provide details in a chronological order.

3. Himley Bonfire – 5 November 2011

- The public bonfire at Himley used the title 'London Calling' and a soundtrack was produced by the pyrotechnic contractor that interspersed memorable commentaries with sport related music. The bonfire was used to launch a programme of activities in the Borough that link to 2012 and the Games. Former and potential Olympians and Paralympians were present at the bonfire.
- The link between the Himley Bonfire and the chosen theme and the Games in 2012 was acknowledged by the award of Inspire Mark and the event became part of a family of projects united in the ambition to use the Games to make real and lasting change.

4. Dudley Schools' Sports Association Awards Evening December 2012

- Former Olympian David Moorcroft, Chairman of West Midlands Leadership Group for 2012, spoke, and presented awards, at the Dudley Schools' Sports Association (DSSA) Awards Evening in December 2011.
- The annual awards evening recognises the achievements of talented young sports people from schools across the Borough all who have been selected for representative honours. Some of the young people compete in their chosen sport at district representative level while there are others who have progressed to national and international

David Moorcroft, spoke to the young people and their parents who were present at the Awards evening recalling his athletics career and illustrating the links between the region and the Olympic and Paralympic Games in London in 2012.

5. Get Set' Education Programme

- 'Get Set' is the official London 2012 education programme. The link to the website is below although registration is restricted to schools http://getset.london2012.com/en/home
- The website includes resources, ideas and opportunities to help schools make the most of the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games. The Get Set network is a special community of schools and colleges which are:

demonstrating a commitment to the Olympic and Paralympic Values: respect, friendship, equality, excellence, inspiration, courage and determination

Using the London 2012 Games to inspire learners of all ages and abilities to get involved in Values-based projects and activities.

- Any school or college in the UK can become a member of the Get Set network and will receive rewards and recognition from London 2012 and participating schools will receive an allocation of tickets to the Games.
- The total number of schools signed up to Get Set and to the Get Set network is shown in the following table:

6. Dawley Brook Primary School, Kingswinford - DeCoubertin Oak

- Dawley Brook Primary School in Kingswinford is a Green Flag Eco school and is part of the London 2012 Get Set Network. Because of this the head teacher was contacted by the DeCoubertin Oak Project to plant a commemorative oak tree in the grounds of the School. The project is set to plant a ribbon of Coubertin Oaks from Much Wenlock, across the country, down to the Olympic Village and Stadium.
- Dawley Brook is one of only eleven primary schools in the country to be part of this special Olympic Games Legacy project. The School planted their tree on Friday 27th April.
- Forty Coubertin Oaks have been planted to link Much Wenlock with the Olympic Park in London. A total of twenty seven Get Set Network schools and colleges will be involved. The "ribbon" of trees will begin with five to be planted at the William Brookes School and one at Much Wenlock Primary School.
- The "ribbon" will pass through various points from Much Wenlock to the Olympic Park, including Stoke Mandeville Combined School and The Mandeville School, both close to Stoke Mandeville Hospital, the birthplace of the Paralympic Games.
- Four oaks will be planted in the Olympic Park to complete the ribbon. Three oaks will be sited temporarily in the Athletes' Village during the Olympic and Paralympic Games. They will be moved to their legacy location on the park soon after.
- One oak has already been planted in the Royal Horticultural Society Great British Garden.
- Twenty-five other Get Set schools and colleges will provide intervening planting locations. In total there will be three further education colleges, ten secondary schools, one junior school, eleven primary schools, one special school and support service and one independent school involved. In addition de Coubertin Oaks will be planted at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew, The Forestry Commission's National Arboretum and UPS Ltd offices in Tamworth.
- The planting ceremony was another stage in the build-up to the London Olympic and Paralympic Games and the project team hopes that pupils, staff and the wider community will value the links that the tree creates both with the Games and with the associated historic and environmental elements.

7. Dancing for the Games

- Dancing for the Games has been a West Midland-wide celebration as part of the Cultural Olympiad. In the summer of 2011 'Making Links' a dance performance took place at Mushroom Green using the historic chain makers premises as a venue. This was preceded in 2010 by the 'Making Links' performance that took place at the Solid Swivel chain makers in Cradley Heath.
- The performances formed part of the regional 'Dancing for the Games' programme.
- Spill playground dance
- Spill is a specially choreographed production for children and families which will tour over 30 parks in the West Midlands over the summer of 2012 using playground equipment as the set. Each performance is unique as the who uses the equipment available on site.
- Spill performances were staged at Huntingtree Park in Halesowen and Mary Stevens Park in Stourbridge in May 2012 and were well received.
- DPA summer festival Breathe to the Beat July 2012
- The DPA summer festival will include the Breathe the Beat roadshow that will tour the West Midlands region throughout the summer of 2012. These roadshows will showcase local talent, professional dance companies and appearances by the Breathe the Beat artists.
- A wide range of high quality dance performers and groups of any style, from hip-hop to Bhangra are being invited to perform solos, duets or group pieces as part of the festival.

8. The Stourbridge Education Trust (TSET) Olympics

- In 2010 the partners forming Stourbridge Education Trust (TSET), Pedmore Tech, Redhill, Ridgewood High School and Thorns plus King Edward VI College and Stourbridge College launched their annual inter-school games. Each of the participants is part of the Get Set programme and the event is registered as a Community Games.
- The TSET Olympics have grown and in 2012 will around 1,000 young people will mark the London 2012 Games with an event on 19 June 2012 at Himley Park which will be followed by a second day of competition on 21 June 2012 at The Dell Stadium. The winners of the competitions will be invited to collect their trophies at a celebration and presentation evening on 2 July 2012.
- Activities at Himley will include golf, volleyball, tag rugby, 5-a-side and softball while the event at The Dell will focus on traditional track and field events.

 The foundations that have been established for the TSET Olympics provides the basis for the competitions to continue as a legacy from London 2012.

9. School Games

- The School Games are one of the legacy programmes inspired by London 2012 and operate on four levels:
 - Level 1 Intra-school competition
 - Level 2 Inter-school competition
 - Level 3 County School Games Festival
 - Level 4 UK School Games
- Schools in Dudley are involved in Levels 1 to 3 with Levels 1 and 2 being co-ordinated by School Games Organisers (SGOs) operating from the three specialist sports colleges Coseley School, Ellowes and Windsor. Level 3 co-ordination is supported by officers from the Sport and Physical Activity section working collaboratively with colleagues from neighbouring authorities and the BeActive Partnership.
- Representatives from Dudley schools took part in the Black Country School Games Festival on Wednesday 6 July 2011, one of nine pilots across the country which are precursors to a national programme of School Games Festivals in 2012. Organisation of the event was a partnership between the local authorities, the Black Country BeActive Partnership and schools.
- More than 1500 young people took part in the events which were held in Wolverhampton.
- In 2012 a Winter Games Festival was held at The University of Wolverhampton in Walsall and the Summer Festival will take place on Friday 29 June 2012 at Aldersley Leisure Village in Wolverhampton.

10. The Olympic Torch Relay

- The Olympic Torch Relay is one of the strongest links between the modern Olympic Movement and the Ancient Olympic Games and is considered to be the second most important communications tool after the Games themselves. The Torch Relay is considered to be one means of bringing the Olympic spirit to other parts of the country in the build up to the Games.
- The Olympic Flame is lit at the Temple of Hera in Olympia among the ruins of the home of the Ancient Games. A 10 day relay around Greece follows before the Flame is handed to the Host City and is then delivered to the Host Country.

The Flame is transferred from one Torch Bearer to another spreading the message of peace, unity and friendship before ending its journey at the cauldron lighting at the Opening Ceremony of the Olympic Games.

11. The 2012 Olympic Torch Relay

- The Olympic Flame arrived in the UK on Friday 18 May 2012. The Torch Relay began on Saturday 19 May 2012 at Lands End and the Flame will travel around the UK for 70 days. The Olympic Torch Relay has been branded 'Moment to Shine'.
- 8,000 Torch Bearers will carry the Flame on its 8,000 mile journey and the Flame will come within 1 hour of 95% of the population of the UK. The Relay will bring the 2012 Games to people's doorsteps and will showcase the best of the UK.
- Half of Torch Bearer places have been allocated to young people as the Torch Relay is for everyone but has a focus on youth.
- Local authorities invited the Torch Relay to visit their area and are providing behind-the-scenes services and advice to support the Relay.
- The Torch Relay is supported by three presenting partners Samsung, Coca Cola and Lloyds TSB who will provide major promotional support, generate excitement and engage people. The presenting partners will be present in the Relay convoy, forming part of both the pre-activation and Activation Convoy that will draw people to the streets and entertain them in anticipation of the arrival of the Flame.
- In addition to the three presenting partners there are a number of Torch Relay supporters including Aggreko, BMW, BT, EDF Energy, Holiday Inn and Visa.
- The Olympic Games and the Torch Relay have been deemed to be events of national significance and as such are subject to the highest levels of security. The Activation Convoy will be managed by local police forces, but the Flame Convoy will be the responsibility of the Metropolitan Police Service (MPS). The MPS will secure and protect the Olympic Flame and all Torch Bearers, ensuring the Flame transfer from one Torch to another.

12. West Midlands and Black Country

The Olympic Torch Relay will pass through the West Midlands on a number of days, with events being staged on overnight stops in Worcester on Thursday 24 May 2012 (Day 6), Stoke-on-Trent on Wednesday 30 May 2012 (Day 10), Birmingham on Saturday 30 June 2012 (Day 43) and Coventry on Sunday 1 July 2012 (Day 44).

- On Day 43, Saturday 30 June 2012, the Torch Relay travels from Derby to Birmingham via Burton-on-Trent, Lichfield, Tamworth, South Staffordshire and the Black Country.
- The route through the Black Country takes in Bloxwich, Leamore, Birchills, Walsall, Willenhall, Wolverhampton, Coseley, Dudley, Oldbury, West Bromwich and Smethwick. The Relay will be in the Black Country for nearly 7 hours from 12.00 to 18.50 and will involve the Flame being carried by more than 70 Torch Bearers.

13. Details of the Route in Dudley

- On Day 43 of the Olympic Torch Relay, Dudley will be a Community on Route (CoR). The Olympic Torch will visit the Borough between 16.21 and 17.49.
- Throughout the visit to Dudley the Torch Relay will be in Torch Bearer mode, travelling at around 4mph. 12 Torch Bearers have been identified and Appendix 1 Table 1 includes the list of Torch Bearers and their home. Table 2 in Appendix 1 identifies local people who have been Torch Bearers in other areas. This information and pen portraits are available on the London 2012 website.
- The Torch Relay will be on the public highway Birmingham New Road A4123 - from 16.21 through to 16.50. The relay enters the Borough in Coseley at the junction of A4123 and Shaw Road.
- The Torch Convoy then passes Coseley School Specialist Sports College and Silver Jubilee Park – Healthy Hub then continues along the A4123.
- At 16.50 Torch Bearer enters Dudley Canal Trust off A4123 while the Convoy proceeds to Tipton Road junction, turns right and enters Black Country Living Museum (BCLM) for an Afternoon Time Adjustment Break (ATAB).
- The Flame spends nearly an hour with Dudley Canal Trust and in the BCLM travelling initially by narrowboat, on President, the only remaining steam powered narrowboat, and then by tram.
- At 17.43 Torch Relay leaves BCLM returning to the public highway and travelling along Tipton Road to Birmingham Road where Torch is carried to Burnt Tree junction where it reverts to Convoy Mode at 17.49.

14. Torch Convoy

- The convoy is in two parts The Activation Convoy and The Flame Convoy. The former is around 15 minutes in advance of the latter. The times given above relate to the arrival of the Torch Convoy and therefore the Activation element of the Convoy should be assumed to be some minutes in advance.
- Prior to the Activation Convoy and Flame Convoy there will be a pre activation convoy comprising vehicles belonging to Presenting Partners –Coca Cola, Samsung and Lloyds TSB. This will be between 30 and 60 minutes in advance of the main Activation and Flame convoys.
- The Activation Convoy will be managed by West Midlands Police while the Flame Convoy will be the responsibility of the Metropolitan Police Service.

15. Activities on Route

- Coseley School Specialist Sports College are organising a school fun day including a five-a-side competition which will conclude shortly before the arrival of Torch Relay. Coseley School is a 'Get Set Network' school.
- Silver Jubilee Park Healthy Hub is planning an Olympic themed activity day to celebrate the investment from Department of Health as Healthy Towns was a London 2012 Legacy programme. This event will finish shortly before arrival of Torch Relay.
- Dudley Canal Trust will be open to visitors to book trips as normal until 3.30pm and will then welcome the Flame around one hour later. Local uniformed groups will welcome the Flame onto site.
- Black Country Living Museum will host a day of cultural and sporting activities culminating in the visit of the Torch Relay. This will be the setting for the Civic welcome for the Flame in Dudley.
- The capacity for the event has been agreed by LOCOG at 2,000 people. Admission will be free of charge, but by ticket only which have been distributed by ballot.
- The Canal Trust and BCLM are likely to be the main focus of the visit to Dudley and officers from West Midlands Police have visited both sites to consider security issues.
- The St Thomas's Community Games coincides with the visit of the Torch Relay. It has been suggested that there could be a celebration of the Torch Relay visiting Birmingham Road, possibly from the elevated section opposite Castle Gate.

 Churches Together in Dudley will provide refreshments at the junction of Tipton Road and Birmingham Road and will include the Salvation Army who have a national target of providing 1 million drinks of water over the Olympic and Paralympic summer.

16. Planning for the Torch Relay

- The plans for the visit of the Torch Relay have been presented to the Safety Advisory Group (SAG) and the visit will remain a standing agenda item until mid-summer 2012. A Multi-agency Community Task Force (CTF) has been convened to manage planning.
- The Local Resilience Forum (LRF) has been regularly updated on the implications of the visit of the Olympic Torch and staged an exercise in late April focusing on collaborative working between a wide range of agencies in case of emergency.
- There are regular Black Country meetings to co-ordinate the activities of the four authorities. The four Chief Executives through ABCA called for this arrangement and they receive regular update reports. Colleagues from the Black Country Consortium support this process and provide a link to well established regional networks.
- West Midlands Police call regular meetings which provide information from local authorities to assist the activities of the police. In mid-March the emergency services staged a table top exercise at Tally-Ho Police Training Centre in Birmingham to test plans for the Torch Relay.
- At a Black Country level a Chief Inspector from West Midlands Police is the Bronze Commander for the co-ordination of local events and the safe passage of the Torch on Day 43, Saturday 30 June 2012. His role is to ensure that plans progress consistently and that there is a consistent approach to delivering the event.
- A list of all parallel events that coincide with the visit of the Torch Relay or the Olympic and Paralympic Games are being collated to ensure that resources are deployed as appropriate.
- Threat levels at a national level and connected with the Olympic activities have been combined into a single threat level which will be continuously monitored.
- The visit of the Torch Relay to Dudley on Day 43 provides the opportunity to review the progress in the preceding days. LOCOG and the Government Olympic Executive (GOE) will collate reports at the end of each day and will share information with all Communities on Route.

17. Community Games

- The Community Games programme provides an opportunity to bring communities together to take part in sporting and cultural activities inspired by, and in celebration of, the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games.
- Games are organised in a way that works for the community and they are intended to celebrate the uniqueness of that community. This is from the setting – the activities might take place outside in a park or inside a community centre – to the time of year and the type of activities on offer.
- Some communities will focus on contests to give the event a competitive element while others may focus on giving people the opportunity to try a new activity. Whatever the focus of the Community Games it should provide an opportunity for everyone to participate.
- A ceremony to open or close the event, and to celebrate the hard work that has gone into organising Community Games, is a prerequisite. This is also an opportunity to showcase cultural activity that takes place in the community which is the other required element.
- Above all, the Community Games programme aims to capture the core values of the Olympic and Paralympic movements, and events should reflect these.
- Registered Community Games in Dudley over the summer include:
 - Motiv8 Through Sport at the Dell Stadium
 - St Thomas's Community Games 2012
 - Cradley Celebrates
 - Silver Jubilee Healthy Hub Games
 - Wacky Wednesday activities at the Healthy Hubs

Information about Community Games has been shared widely.

18. International Festival of Glass / British Glass Bienale Contemporary Glass Society - Glass Games

The Contemporary Glass Society (CGS) will stage a summer of celebrations in 2012 which capture the Olympic spirit and endeavour to bring the artistry, innovation and sheer brilliance of glass to more people than ever before. Glass Games events will be staged around the country and to mark the progress seven major events will host a ceremonial glass baton created for the Games by artist Bruce Marks. Between 22 August and 15 September 2012 the Ruskin Glass Centre in Amblecote will be hosting a display of glass medallions, each one reflecting the artist's unique interpretations of the Olympic medal. This will form part of the International Festival of Glass (IFG) and the glass baton will be at Ruskin Glass Centre on 27 August 2012.

19. Inspire Programme Projects in Dudley

 Glass Games is a project awarded the Inspire Mark and is one of over 2,700 projects that are part of this London 2012 programme that seeks to use the Games to provide the inspiration to make real and lasting change.

Other projects in Dudley to have been awarded the Inspire Mark include:

- Sport Unlimited
- Sportivate
- 'London Calling' Himley Bonfire 2011
- Making Links dance performance inspired by the industrial heritage of the Black Country
- Sycamore Adventure

Through regional dance activity 'Dancing for the Games' many other dance programmes taking place in the Borough are linked to London 2012 by the Inspire Mark.

20. Potential Olympians / Paralympians from the Borough

- At this point in time it is likely that four sports people with Borough connections could be competing in London in 2012. Final selection and the announcement of teams is unlikely to be complete until later in the summer.
 - Gymnastics: Kristian Thomas Earls Gymnastics Club
 A member of the Great Britain mens team that won the first ever European Gymnastics team gold medal for GB in Montpellier on 26 May 2012.
 - Track cycling: Jessica Varnish Halesowen Athletic and Cycling Club

Jessica Varnish is the most promising young talent of the British Track Cycling Team and has her eyes on Gold medals at the Olympic Games in London 2012.

Jess is a product of the British Cycling Olympic Development programme. She has become an integral part of the women's sprint team, claiming two 2nd place finishes at the European

Championships and most recently a World Championship Silver medal. Jess will be looking to add to her medal collection at London 2012 where she has a great chance of securing a top 3 finish.

• Wheelchair Tennis: Jordanne Whiley from Halesowen

Jordanne first played wheelchair tennis aged two. She played locally in the West Midlands and took part in wheelchair tennis camps organised by the Tennis Foundation and Jordanne has gone on to develop into one of the highest ranked British players. She made her Paralympic Games debut in Beijing in 2008 and hopes to make an impact in London in 2012.

 Paracycling: Helen Scott – Halesowen Athletic and Cycling Club

Helen joined British Cycling as an U23 Sprint Academy rider in late 2008 and went on to join the GB Para-Cycling Team in April 2010 where she is a tandem pilot working alongside visually impaired female riders known as 'stokers'.

21. Sportivate

- Sportivate is a national £32 million Lottery programme that gives 14-25 year olds access to six-week courses in a range of sports including judo, golf, tennis, wakeboarding, athletics, and parkour or free running. Sportivate is one of the Sport England legacy programmes branded as Places People Play and has been awarded the Inspire Mark.
- The programme is aimed at those who are not currently choosing to take part in sport in their own time, or are doing so for a very limited amount of time, and will support them to continue playing sport in their community after the six weeks is up. During the six weeks a participant may work towards an event or personal challenge.
- Sportivate is fully inclusive and targets participants where it is considered necessary, including young people who have a disability, males and females and people from BME groups.
- In the Borough Lions Boxing Club was a successful pilot project and the activities were used by the BeActive Sports Partnership to encourage other groups to bid for funds. Other Sportivate programmes in Dudley include:

- Football for BME youth group Dell Stadium
- Football for students with learning disabilities Glasshouse College
- Football for students with disabilities Old Park Special School
- Wheelchair basketball Crystal Leisure Centre
- Multi-sport Pens Meadow Special School
- Multi-sport Young Carers

The Sportivate programme is likely to continue to until 2017 with suggested increases in funding subject to Lottery sales.

22. Inspired Facilities - Priory Boxing Club

- One of the Sport England legacy programmes associated with the Games is Inspired Facilities, a capital funding programmes targeted towards sports clubs in particular. Priory Boxing Club in Dudley was supported in making a bid for funds by officers from Dudley MBC and from the BeActive Black Country Sports Partnership and were successful in securing a £50,000 which will enable them to extend their premises and offer a wider range of activities.
- Other borough clubs have submitted successful applications to the Inspired Facilities programme and these include Kewford Eagles Football Club. Other clubs either have applications pending or are in the process of formulating future applications. There are likely to be three further rounds of Inspired Facilities funding with the next round due to open to applicants on 27 July 2012.

23. All the Bells - Friday 27 July 2012

- On the opening day of the London 2012 Olympic & Paralympic Games, Turner Prize-winning artist and musician Martin Creed will create Work No. 1197: All the bells in a country rung as quickly and as loudly as possible for three minutes throughout the country as the UK welcomes 205 nations from around the world.
- In this once-in-a-lifetime event, people across the UK are being encouraged to ring different kinds of bells – alarm clock bells, bicycle bells, boat bells, mobile phone bells, church bells, cowbells, handbells, school bells, town hall bells, and of course jingle bells – to usher in the Olympic Games.

The Dudley Inter-Faith Network and Dudley Churches Together have been notified of the opportunity to be involved. Further promotion will take place over the next few weeks.

Finance

- 24. Costs associated with the visit of the Olympic Torch Relay will be met from resources held by the Directorate of the Urban Environment. All other activities detailed above delivered directly by the Council will also be funded from existing resources.
- 25. Many of the legacy programmes provide the opportunity for organisations to bid for funding for their projects. Where possible, relevant Council Officers will assist organisations in this process.

Law

- 26. Section 111 of the Local Government Act, 1972 enables the Council to do anything that is calculated to facilitate or is conducive or incidental to the discharging of its functions as a Local Authority.
- 27. Section 2 of the Local Government Act 2000 empowers the Council to take action to implement measures it considers likely to achieve the promotion or improvement of the economic, social or environmental well-being of the Borough.

Equality Impact

28. The proposals contained in this report are in full accordance with the Council's Equality and Diversity policies.
