

What is Climate Change?

Since the 1800s, human activities have been the main driver of climate change, primarily due to the burning of fossil fuels (like coal, oil and gas), which produces heat-trapping gases, mostly carbon dioxide (CO₂). These gases cause a greenhouse effect in the earth's atmosphere, trapping the sun's heat and causing temperatures to rise. The burning of fossil fuels is also directly harmful to health and the environment because of the pollutants generated and their impact on air quality.

The effects of Climate Change

- **Hotter temperatures;** Nearly all land areas are seeing more hot days and heat waves; hotter temperatures increase heat-related illnesses and can make it more difficult to work and move around.
- **More severe storms;** Changes in temperature cause changes in rainfall. This results in more severe and frequent storms. They cause flooding and landslides, destroying homes and communities, and costing billions of pounds.
- **Not enough food;** Changes in climate and increases in extreme weather events are among the reasons behind a global rise in hunger and poor nutrition. Fisheries crops, and livestock may be destroyed or become less productive. Heat stress can diminish water and grasslands for grazing.

The effects of Climate Change *(continued)*

- **A warming, rising ocean;** The ocean soaks up most of the heat from global warming. This melts ice sheets and raises sea levels, threatening both coastal and inland communities.
- **Loss of species;** Climate change poses risks to the survival of species on land and in the ocean. These risks increase as temperatures climb. Some species will be able to relocate and survive, but others will not.
- **Poverty and Displacement;** Climate change increases the factors that put and keep people in poverty. Floods destroy homes and livelihoods. Heat can make it difficult to work in outdoor jobs. Weather-related disasters displace 23 million people a year, leaving many more vulnerable to poverty. Increasing temperatures may lead to mass migration to cooler climates.

Tackling the Climate Emergency in Dudley

- In Dudley we declared a climate emergency in July 2020 to address the impact of temperature increases in Dudley.
- We are working towards the West Midlands Mayoral target of making the West Midlands a Net Zero region by 2041.
- Dudley's Carbon Reduction Plan, will set us on the path to become carbon neutral by 2030, in line with the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) target of limiting global temperature rise to 1.5°C. This will require a concerted action at all levels.
- Decarbonising the Borough is a key priority

- Creation of a new Cabinet Portfolio for Waste Management and Climate Change
- Set up of a new Scrutiny Committee to focus on Climate Change and Environment

- Set up of a Climate Change Group (public and staff engagement) to communicate actions and progress.
- Policy reviews to align climate actions to planning policy, transport, public health and well-being, safer communities, sustainable neighbourhoods.




Air Quality


The scale of the challenge – achieving net zero

- **Buildings;** existing buildings, homes and businesses are the single biggest source of emissions. We need to invest in energy efficiency and climate resilience and create local skills and jobs to deliver the program.
- **New Development;** building for the future of Dudley, reducing emissions and supporting net zero
- **Transport;** the second biggest source of emissions, we need to encourage public transport (Metro), walking, cycling and the roll-out of ultra low emission vehicles.
- **Energy;** Invest in renewable energy generation




Dudley's Starting Point

- Investment in corporate buildings, secured **£4.4m** from BEIS PSDS, decarbonisation fund, supporting heat pumps, solar PV and improved insulation.
- Secured **£2.5m** ERDF funding, as part of Low Carbon Place Strategy
- Switching to 100% green renewable energy
- LEDs to **7,000** streetlights
- **74%** Council housing stock have an EPC rating of C or above
- **£1.4m** decarbonization grant this year matched by £1m council investment.
- **£50,000**, Feasibility grant to identify future decarbonization investment.
- 3 x leisure centers improved energy efficiency by installing heat pumps and solar PV.
