Report of the trustees

For the year ended 31 March 2009

The trustees present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2009.

The reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Structure, governance and management

Organisational structure

The affairs of Daycare Trust are directed by the board of trustees who are also the directors of the company limited by guarantee. The trustees meet formally at least six times a year. There is a formal agenda for meetings which is agreed in advance by the chair and the chief executives. The day to day management of Daycare Trust is delegated to joint chief executives and a senior management team.

Daycare Trust has staff organised in five teams: policy, research and campaigns; fundraising; consultancy; training; conferences and events; and business development and administration.

Appointment of trustees

All trustees are members of Daycare Trust and are elected at an annual general meeting for a term of three years which may be renewed once.

Co-opted trustees and replacement of trustees

Trustees have the power to appoint any person to be a trustee to fill a vacancy among trustees or as an addition to the existing trustees, however, the total number of additional trustees shall not exceed 4. Any trustee so appointed holds office until the following annual general meeting and is eligible for re-election.

During 2008 the memorandum and articles of association of the company were changed, after a consultation with the then members of the company. The membership agreed to a proposal that allowed individuals to become supporter members of Daycare Trust without being guaranteeing members of the company. Full membership of the company remains available to those who wish to be full members.

Report of the trustees

Members of the charitable company guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charitable company in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at 31 March 2009 was 20 (2008 - 20). The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charitable company.

Related parties and connected organisations

Daycare Trust Enterprises is a controlled subsidiary of Daycare Trust. Since 1 April 2006 it has not operated.

The National Childcare Campaign is a dormant company which transferred its activities to Daycare Trust some years ago. There remain common members.

Risk statement

The trustees have undertaken a full risk assessment and keep this under review both at Trustee meetings and by review of the regular risk reviews carried out by the management team.

Areas covered include recruitment of skilled staff, governance, legislation, compliance, delivery of contracted projects, diversity of funding, IT data storage and appropriate levels of insurance. Decisions are taken and processes put in place to manage these risks.

Objectives and activities

Daycare Trust is the national childcare charity, campaigning for quality, accessible, affordable childcare for all and raising the voices of children, parents and carers. We advise parents and carers, providers, employers, trade unions and policymakers on childcare issues.

We recognise that everyone is unique and we value difference in our communities. We listen to all views and are committed to act without prejudice. We oppose all discrimination and promote equality in all we do.

We work closely with Government Departments, particularly the Department for Children, Schools and Families, other national childcare organisations, local authorities and partnerships, children's centres and other local childcare providers, regeneration and housing agencies, employers and trade unions, and other local and national bodies in all sectors. Our funding comes from a range of sources.

We undertake high quality research in the childcare field.

We also arrange conferences and other meetings to allow experts to share their knowledge and expertise about childcare issues.

We provide a consultancy service through a network of specialist consultants to employers, local authorities and others to help them develop good childcare strategies and implement them.

We have developed and delivered training for local authorities and others on childcare issues to ensure that those responsible for funding and provision are aware of their responsibilities and understand what is best practice.

Report of the trustees

Public benefit

In considering how the Trust fulfils its aims and objectives the Trustees have had regards to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit. The descriptions of Daycare Trust's charitable activities and plans in the remainder of this report are drafted with this guidance in mind. The services and advice which the Trust provides are available to a wide range of beneficiaries, in most cases at no cost to the beneficiary.

Achievements and performance

The year to 31 March 2009 has seen consolidation in all aspects of Daycare Trust's activities.

We have continued to offer a wide range of childcare and early years-related consultancy services for clients including Government departments, local authorities, PVI providers, children's centres and employers. We also held a major national policy conference, as well as policy seminars on 'good childhood' and 'free range children - improving health and happiness in children'. We also published Raising the Bar - a Childcare workforce policy paper with the TUC and Childcare Futures which sets out the vision of childcare for each of the political parties.

Daycare Trust has continued to carry out research investigating the cost of quality childcare supported by the Nuffield Foundation and concluded a three year project funded by the Esmee Fairbairn Foundation into the barriers to quality and affordable childcare in black and minority ethnic communities. We also continued our study called "Listening to Families" including a strand on listening to older children.

We continue to publish our research and other information both in hard copy and through our website.

We delivered other major projects through the year – our 'Parent Champions' project helped hard to reach families in three local authorities to find out about and take up affordable childcare. Through a four year grant from London Councils, we are helping childcare settings in London to work more effectively to increase access to affordable, quality childcare for London families. We also delivered a project in Sheffield through a grant from Awards for All, and in partnership with the Refugee Council, to encourage refugee parents and their children to access childcare and their free entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds. We also began our Childcare Advance project with funding from the Friends Provident Foundation. This is a nine month scoping project to assess the help currently available to families faced with upfront childcare fees and to recommend models of delivery to help move parents into work.

We also provide a telephone information line for parents, carers and employers and delivered an information project in nine community languages on tax credits, child benefit and other sources of financial help available for families. We also relaunched an improved website and upgraded out telephone and IT systems to support our information service.

We continue to publish the annual childcare costs and holiday costs surveys. Daycare Trust again organised the annual National Childcare Week, now in its 11th year. This included an award ceremony and reception in 10 Downing Street hosted by the Prime Minister, sponsored by Children's Mutual and a circus in the park, sponsored by Catalyst.

Plans for future periods

Daycare Trust will continue to build on its successes and, in the run-up to a general election, to keep the need for universal access to quality and affordable childcare at the front of the agenda for both government and employers. It will do this by continuing to carry out research, by lobbying government and other organisations on issues that affect the lives of children and parents and by providing clear information and training to families, providers, employers and other interested parties.

We will focus on building up our consultancy and training activity, as a means of influencing good practice within local authorities.

We will continue to publicise our work in the media, by publishing papers and other documents, by providing an information line. Greater emphasis will be placed on the website as a means of dissemination.

Financial review

The results for the year to 31 March 2009 are shown in detail in the statement of financial activities on page 9 and are summarised below:

The main sources of Daycare Trust's income are shown in note 4 to the accounts on page 13. The largest component of income in the year to 31 March 2009 was a number of grants and a contract from the Department for Children Schools and Families. There were also grants from a number of organisations to fund particular pieces of research. The income from consultancy services and our conferences and training are also a contribution to revenue.

Basis of preparation of financial statements

At the date that these financial statements were approved by the Trustees in October 2009 funding was not yet fully in place to enable Daycare Trust to continue to operate through the following financial year (to 31 March 2011) at its current level of establishment. There are grant and other funding applications submitted which, if successful, would allow Daycare Trust to continue in its current form. In addition Daycare Trust expects to receive a financial contribution from its consultancy activities as well as an additional contribution from its training programme. These accounts are prepared on the basis that sufficient funding will be received to allow Daycare Trust to continue to operate in its current form. If that is not possible the Trustees have put in place a contingency plan which will involve gradual reductions in its establishment and its costs. These would allow Daycare Trust to perform its existing obligations and meet its existing liabilities. Accordingly these financial statements are prepared on the basis that Daycare Trust will continue as a going concern.

Reserves policy

The Reserve and cash positions are regularly monitored and reviewed by the Resources Monitoring Group and recommendations are made to the meetings of the trustees.

Report of the trustees

The trustees have a policy which aims to build up, over time, reserves which will amount to three months running costs, including salaries, which based on the 2009/10 budget is around £400,000. The available general funds at 31 March 2009 are £117,000 (i.e. reserves less fixed assets) and the organisation aims to move towards its target over the coming years. At present considerable attention is given to both short and longer term cash requirements.

Responsibilities of the trustees

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the year then ended.

In preparing those financial statements which give a true and fair view, the trustees should follow best practice and:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis

The trustees are responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985.

The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Each of the trustees confirm that to the best of his/her knowledge there is no information relevant to the audit of which the auditors are unaware. The trustees also confirm that they have taken all necessary steps to ensure that they themselves are aware of all relevant audit information and that this information has been communicated to the auditors.

Auditors

Sayer Vincent were re-appointed as the charitable company's auditors during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity.

Independent auditors' report

Notes to the financial statements

For the year ended 31 March 2009

1. Accounting policies

a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985. They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005).

At the date that these financial statements were approved by the trustees in October 2009 there was not sufficient funding in place to enable Daycare Trust to continue to operate though the following financial year (to 31 March 2010) at its current level of establishment. There are grant and other funding applications submitted which, if successful, would allow Daycare Trust to continue in its current form. In addition Daycare Trust expects to receive a financial contribution from its consultancy activities as well as an additional contribution from its training programme. These accounts are prepared on the basis that sufficient funding will be received to allow Daycare Trust to continue to operate in its current form. If that is not possible the trustees have put in place a contingency plan which will involve gradual reductions in in its establishment and its costs. These would allow Daycare Trust to perform its existing obligations and meet its existing liabilities. Accordingly these financial statements are prepared on the basis that Daycare Trust will continue as a going concern.

- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable.
- Grants are recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are receivable.

Contractual income received is recognised when receivable unless it relates to a specific future period, in which case it is deferred as income in advance.

d) Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. The cost of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the Trust's staff is apportioned to each activity on the basis of the staff members involved in each activity.

Support costs, being the costs of the central administrative and management staff are reallocated to each of the activities pro rata the numbers of staff involved in each activity.

e) Governance costs are the costs associated with the governance arrangements of the charity. These costs are associated with constitutional and statutory requirements and include any costs associated with the strategic management of the charity's activities.

The costs of generating funds relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in raising funds for the charitable work.

Notes to the financial statements

For the year ended 31 March 2009

1. Accounting policies (continued)

f) Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life. For leasehold improvements this is the remaining life of the lease. A full year's depreciation is charged in the year of acquisition. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

Leasehold improvements	11 years
Computer equipment	3 years
Furniture and equipment	4 years

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £1,500. Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities.

- g) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.
- h) Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity.
- Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.
- j) Transfers between funds are made by the Trustees to reflect appropriate charges between funds in the years after the original income has been recognised in the financial statements.
- k) Rentals payable under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership remain with the lessor, are charged to the statement of financial activities in the year in which they fall due.
- I) The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charitable company in an independently administered fund. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable under the scheme by the charitable company to the fund. The charitable company has no liability under the scheme other than for the payment of those contributions.

There are further monitoring requirements for the remainder of the grant from the Department for Children, Schools and Families.

Daycare Trust received £70,000 from London Councils to fund the London Childcare Providers Network. As at 31 March 2009 an amount of £24,000 remained unspent as plans for a major providers forum meeting and other events and activities were postponed until after 31 March 2009. These amounts were fully spent by 30 June 2009.

Purposes of restricted funds

London Development Agency

This funding was to enable the Trust and three other organisations in related fields of work to collaborate on lobbying activity at the main party conferences.

Department for Children Schools and Families

This funding was to enable Daycare Trust to improve its ability to respond to callers to its information line and improve other information services.

London Childcare Providers Network

This funding, from September 2008 enabled Daycare Trust to set up and service a mutual network for childcare providers in the London Boroughs.

Education Project

London Councils - Workforce This funding, ultimately from the European Social Fund was to allow Daycare Trust to monitor and support a third party which delivered a childcare workforce education project in a London borough. The costs met by the income received in 2008/09 were incurred and written off in the three years before 31 March 2006.

Childcare Advance -Friends Provident Foundation

This funding was for a research project to find out ways of providing access to the up front funding often needed by families seeking early years nursery provision.

Awards For All - Refugee Training

This funding enabled Daycare Trust to deliver training in South Yorkshire to refugees families seeking access to childcare.

Department for Children Schools and Families

This strategic grant supported a range of policy, research and information dissemination activities which are part of Daycare Trusts charitable objectives.

Purposes of designated funds

The purpose and requirement for all the designated funds has been review by management and trustees at the year end in the light of the current position of Daycare Trust.

Premises contingency

To fund future premises improvements and any other liabilities arising under the lease of the office accommodation.

Leasehold improvements

This fund represents the net book value of the partitioning at the Daycare Trust's offices. In the light of an imminent move from its current premises the remaining book value of these improvements has been expensed.

Transfer from restricted funds to general funds

This transfer is in respect of a project that was completed in the year to 31 March 2007 but the final tranche of funding was not received until April 2008. Daycare Trust wrote off the costs associated with this funding (including its own staff costs) against its general unrestricted fund in the two years to 31 March 2007 as, at the time, there was some uncertainty about the receipt of the final tranche of this funding. Now that this has been received the trustees therefore have agreed to transfer the amount to unrestricted funds as they are satisfied that these funds had been spent to support the restricted activity in the two years to 31 March 2007.
