Purpose of the report	<ul> <li>Dudley HWB should undertake a PNA to meet its statutory obligation to ensure identification of current and future pharmaceutical service needs for its population.</li> <li>At the December 2014 HWB, the draft PNA for consultation was approved (subject to minor amendments).</li> <li>To update the HWB on the outcome of the consultation.</li> <li>To present the final version of the PNA.</li> </ul>		
Law	The NHS (Pharmaceutical and Local Pharmaceutical Services) Regulations 2013, effective from 1 April 2013, provide a requirement for all HWBs to:  • Make a revised assessment as soon as is reasonably practicable after identifying significant changes to the need

Background	From 1 <sup>st</sup> April 2013, every Health and Wellbeing Board (HWB) England has a statutory responsibility to publish and keep up date a statement of the needs for pharmaceutical services for t population in its area, referred to as a 'Pharmaceutical Nee Assessment'.		
	The PNA will help in the commissioning of pharmaceutical services in the context of local priorities, and will be used by NHS England when making decisions on applications to open new pharmacies (referred to as the market entry test).

- The distribution of health needs and pharmaceutical services in the area.
- Services in neighbouring Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) areas that might affect the need for services for people in Dudley.
- The Healthy Living Pharmacy (HLP) model.
- Conclusions on the assessment of pharmaceutical need.
- Potential gaps in provision that could be met by providing more services through existing provision of pharmacies and likely future pharmaceutical needs.

As the results of the PNA can influence market entry of new pharmaceutical services and allow changes to existing contracts, a formal consultation is required. The 60 day consultation must invite the views of the Local Pharmaceutical Committee; the Local Medical Committee; pharmacies and dispensing doctors; Healthwatch; patients, consumer or community groups with an interest in the provision of pharmaceutical services; NHS trusts / foundation trusts; NHS England and any neighbouring HWBs.

Healthwatch was commissioned to establish the views of the public and patients of pharmacy services during the summer of 2014 and the outcome influenced the draft PNA report.

The draft PNA for consultation was presented and discussed at the last HWB meeting, which gave approval for the draft report to go out to formal consultation subject to minor amendments. The consultation ran from the 18<sup>th</sup> December 2014 to the 16<sup>th</sup> February 2015. 30 responses were received to the consultation report. These responses have been reviewed, discussed by the PNA steering group and amendments made to the final PNA if necessary (as determined by the steering group). All comments are included within **Appendix 12** of the **full** PNA document.

The main focus of discussion at the previous HWB related to access to pharmaceutical services overnight, aligned with the planned new 24 hour Urgent Care Centre (UCC) from April 2015. To support the consultation and the concerns about pharmaceutical access overnight, the draft PNA was discussed at the Dudley CCG Clinical Development Committee in January 2015.

- We conclude that there are sufficient pharmacies in Dudley to provide essential pharmaceutical services to residents. No





Recommendations for the Board	gaps in provision across the borough have been identified. Our pharmacies are open to provide services at the times needed and used by patients and the public.  • Dudley CCG will be working with the new provider of the UCC, Malling Health, to develop appropriate patient group directives (PGDs) and pharmaceutical stock holding to be operational from 12 midnight to 7am. This will mean that there is provision of access to medication during the period (midnight to 7am).  • The newly commissioned UCC, being the GP out of hours (OOH) service for Dudley residents, will be required to ensure that the urgent pharmaceutical needs of patients can be met. This will normally mean holding medicine stocks in accordance with the national formulary for OOH Service providers.  • The full PNA document can be found on the Committee Management Information System (CMIS).  • To approve the final Dudley PNA for publication on or before 1st April 2015.

As can be seen in the above table the majority of respondents agreed with the draft PNA conclusions (questions 1-4), are happy with the range of services currently available within Dudley (questions 3 to 5), are supportive of the Office of Public Health focussing on development of HLP (question 6) and targeting younger people (question 9) and feel that the PNA gave community pharmacies adequate information to inform their own service provision (question 7).

In response to Question 10 above, 22 responses were received as free text. Some of these comments centred on the Urgent Care Centre and pharmaceutical access and these are displayed below together with the impact that these comments have had on the final version of the Dudley PNA.

A health or social care professional	I would like Dudley to invest in developing a pharmacy alongside the new urgent care centre on the Russells Hall Hospital site. I would like this pharmacy to become a Healthy Living Pharmacy helping with the signposting of patients, local residents and Healthcare professionals to the most appropriate urgent care service. I would like this pharmacy to provide a 7/7 "go to service" for the supply of medicines to outpatients requiring complex medicines and specials. I would like this pharmacy to sell only "evidence based" over the counter medicines alongside a minor ailments scheme and other recommended public health services.	This PNA concludes that a gap in service provision overnight can be met without the need for a full pharmaceutical contract post consultation with Dudley CCG (January 2015).
