A once-failing Netherton school is close to getting the goahead to create a £1.4 million arts centre under ambitious plans to attract international artists to the borough.

Hillcrest School and Community College has submitted spectacular designs for the Performing Arts Academy which would include a series of dance and drama studios equipped with the latest digital technology. The project is the latest achievement by the school, which has seen a remarkable turnaround since it came out of special measures in 1999.

A ONCE FAILING Netherton school has been given the go-ahead to create a £1.4 million dance centre to attract international performers.

Housing prices up as school improves

House prices have more than doubled in Netherton since a failing school was turned around by a pioneering headteacher.

Hillcrest School and Community College used to have a bad name but now it boasts a reputation as one of the best in the country thanks to the work of forwardthinking principal Dame Mo Brennan.

The rundown school was once ranked bottom of the class for its exam results, pupils were unruly and staff morale low.

People looked down their nose at the prospect of living in Netherton because the whole area suffered from a poor image.

But the transformation at Hillcrest has also improved standards in the community and now there is a high demand for homes.

Incredible

Estate agent Beverley Southwick from the Netherton branch of Taylors said just six years ago a three-bedroom semidetached house was on the market for between £45,000 and £50,000 but this has rocketed to around £125,000.

She said: "It's absolutely incredible how house prices have gone through the roof.

"I believe it is down to the transformation at Hillcrest because people are coming into the office saying they want to live in Netherton in order to be within the school's catchment area. As a parent with a daughter at the school I can tell you I only sent her there because Mrs Brennan is running the show and doing a fantastic job.

"The whole appearance of the area has changed, there is less graffiti and litter and the pupils look much smarter."
