Dudley Youth Service Youth Survey 2008.

During February and March young people aged 13-19 years (or up to 25 with disabilities), were asked to feedback on their views and priorities for Dudley Youth Service.

Young Advisors were commissioned to carry out questionnaires, ensuring a geographical and representative spread.


The questionnaire focussed on two main areas, issues facing young people in their communities and secondly, their views on youth service provision.

Feedback has been collated and will inform future service delivery, as well as, additional prioritisation of Youth Opportunity Funds and projects planned through area forums and the Dudley Youth Council.


About the Young Person.

Age responses were broken down as follows –








Young people were firstly asked to give a brief picture as to their present connection with the youth service in order to inform areas such as marketing and promotion.

As can be seen from the chart, 65% of young people indicated that they made some use of youth service provision.








45% of those not attending identified a lack of information as a cause.




The first set of charts identify preferences for days of the week and holidays. 50.5% of those completing a survey said that they would be interested in taking part in holiday provision.


























These results will inform YOF and youth involvement priorities.




Concerns are:- obesity, smoking, healthy eating, alcohol and drugs

Improvements are:- cheaper health clubs, free prescriptions, more information available, smoking cessation and healthy eating options.




Concerns are:- not enough available, too expensive, accessibility and lack of skate parks.

Improvements are:- lower cost, more options, more specifically for under 18's, more youth clubs and more skate parks.




Concerns are:- cost, reliability of buses, not enough buses and the lack of a train station.

Improvements are:- cheaper, more routes, a train station in Dudley, address reliability, cleaner and free transport if not employed.




Concerns are:- knives, lack of police, gangs, drugs, bullying and vandalism

Improvements are: - better street lighting, more police, more CCTV and ban alcohol on the streets.




Concerns are: - litter and graffiti

Improvements are: - more recycling, more bins, less cars, graffiti walls and clean up dog mess.




Concerns are: - DDA and closer to home for easier access.

Improvements are: - more services available, open longer hours (doctors and dentists) and free internet places.




Concerns are: - bullying and feeling put down by teachers.
